UPDATE:

LARKIN ST. YOUTH CENTER

A recent conversation with Peter deGodey was filled with excitement that wanted to share with you. Since the completion of the renovation project last spring many positive things have happened at, and for the center. the area of funding the 1989 budget has been reached and nearly all of the 1990 budget has been pledged. The "professional look " of the center made a major impact in several ways other than just donations. (and many more are coming now) have taken real pride in their center and to quote Peter "there isn't a bit of graffiti in the whole place". practical experience the kids got helping with the remodelling has led to jobs for some of them and plans for a job skills training and placement program in the near future. Although this will include training for in areas besides the building 'trades, BAWA was a spring board for program.

The Center is also continuing to expand. A nine bedroom house has been purchased, which after some minor changes, will be licensed to house up to 18 young people. Part of the funds for this project have been secured and soon bids will be taken for the work. The staff also has been expanded to handle the increasing numbers of kids coming to the center.

The increased effectiveness as well as the physical facility is what is making The Larkin St. Center a model for others and is attracting visitors on a regular basis from all over the country.

Bay Area Woodworkers Association was formed early in 1982 by a small group of dedicated people who felt the need to strengthen the woodworking community by holding regular meetings, establishing an informal forum for the exchange of knowledge and ideas, sponsoring shows, and meeting others in woodworking and related fields. Since then, this non-profit organization has grown to many members. Meetings occur in the third week of each month at 7:00 p.m. and are generally held in San Francisco or Oakland/Berkeley area. Meetings usually have a specific topic such as router techniques, finishing, turning, business aspects of woodworking, or focus on a distinguished guest speaker who will give a presentation in focus on a distinguished guest speaker who will give a presentation in their area of expertise. Most meetings are held in members shops, or the place of business of a guest presenter. Members receive a monthly newsletter.
