

THIRD THURSDAY PREVIEW

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE NOTES:

January's meeting was held by Scott Page, with Luther Greulich, Gary Carter, Russ Falk, John Grew-Sheridan, and Bob Greenberg. Bridge traffic blocked Frank Wallis, whose phone report suggested we were still in business. Many issues involving advertising in our simpler Newsletter were discussed and potentially resolved. There was an active review of future visitors, topics of concern to BAWA members, and general goals of the organization. Possible panels were: local leaders of established firms; gray areas of legal regulation for small business people; the likelihood of success in the "art market."

TANUARY MEETING REVIEW

Through the assistance of member Claudia MacCallum, who is now apprenticing with Art Carpenter, we were privileged to have a slide/lecture given by surgeon Leonard Gordon of Ralph K. Davies (Franklin Hospital) in San Francisco.

Dr. Gordon's slides of injured hands were too gory for some BAWA members but the presentation and the discussion after were first rate. The microsurgery now being performed has been done only in the last ten years and the process of re-attaching a digit is tedious, up to six hours per finger.

We were told that if a major injury occurs prompt action is essential but panic should be avoided. The patient is usually <u>not</u> in pain. The loss of blood can be controlled with elevation and pressure from a bandage. Rarely is a tourniquet required. Ideally, one should use wet sterile gauze soaked in Betadine. But don't make a special trip to the store! Take any severed pieces to the hospital in a chilled container. Wrap it in plastic. Do not put them directly in water or ice because the tissue will become soaked and more difficult to re-attach.

Re-attachment is a matter of judgment. The Davies staff will try to re-attach all severed thumbs and all multiple losses, but single digit amputations are questionable. The factors which influence the decision are cosmetic appearance, future stiffness, fine touch, grasp, motion, sensation, and occupation. Ability to pay or amount of insurance coverage are not considered, though Dr. Gordon did think that Larry Borsian and all woodworkers should have health insurance.

Dr. Gordon warned that in his practice most woodworking injuries occurred after lunch when people are groggy, to experienced workers who had forgotten how to be careful, and on the radial arm saw.

One is Kaiser/Permanente, with its extensive collection of clinics and hospitals. Their reconstructive surgery is done at Davies.


