board. It's more of a fun learning project than a contest, though perhaps someone will come up with some prizes to award by and by. For the June meeting, select a board, flatten it, thickness it to 3/4" (.750), and square all angles. 4 to 6 people will evaluate your board.

Then, for the July meeting, rip the board twice, glue-up, flatten and square it, and size it to .650, and it will be reevaluated. For the August meeting, fill, stain, varnish or whatever to achieve the best finish you can. Arnold said, "It makes no difference if you use hand or machine tools. Just go through the process and learn a lot. The real key is having good squares and a good level surface." The next contest may be building a coopered door.

Our own Stan Booker was our speaker for the May meeting. Stan is one of those unsung heros, a shop teacher. He teaches Jr. High School shop in Hayward, has been doing it for many years and seems to thrive on it. He showed us a number of his teaching techniques and projects. He has his hands full, teaching about 75 kids a day. "They come up with something new every year." They use hand tools or routers. Jr. High is too young for the

table saw.

He puts a lot of emphasis on measurement, because kids typically don't know how to measure. They will often start measuring at the 'one' on the ruler. (I remember doing that!) Stan says, "My philosophy may be different. I want to help the kids come out with something that looks nice at the end. They don't have the discipline to 'do it over and over 'till you get it right." He has a beautiful big mitre box with a 6 inch blade which he sets up with stop blocks for the kids to do cut-offs and mitres.

He showed us the plant stand that he has the 8th graders build and his poster set, with pictures of tools and the different sorts of screws and nails and wood joints. The pictures were taken originally from a Disney World War II animated film on using tools.


He has the kids use phillipsscrews, because slotted screws often get sharp burrs. He mentioned casing nails, which have a flat head (rather than dimpled, like a finishing nail.) You can nail them flush and then just paint over them. He uses a lot of files. They are expensive, but they are something the kids can use very effectively.



TO SQUARE A BOARD

Over the next few months we will be learning the basic methods of squaring, jointing and finishing a board. Arnold Champagne has offered to guide us through the process while sharing some of the knowledge he gained at The College of the Redwoods. To join in the fun and learning experience bring a rough cut hardwood board 1 x 8 x 14 inches and a square. Arnold will get us started, and assign us our homework for the month.

Six steps in squaring a board

- 1) Surface one face
 - a) Establish first flat surface
- 2) Surface second face
 - a) Establish second flat surface
 - b) Obtain thickness
- 3) Joint one edge
 - a) Establish a 90° angle with the face of the board
- 4) Rip second edge
 - a) Establish a second 90° edge
 - b) Obtain the desired width
- 5) Crosscut one end
 - a) Establish a cut 90° from face to end
 - b) Establish a cut 90° from edge to end
- 6) Crosscut second end
 - a) Establish a cut 90° from face to end
 - b) Establish a cut 90° from edge to end
 - c) Establish desired length


