

Ever heard about "Virtual Radius"?

I have been using this method (see enclosed description) for years in my audio furniture production, both for easing hardwood edges and rounding over the edges of thin boards - 1/8 to 1/4 inch thick. It creates a niv\ce edge that require little sanding before finishing.

I set up an inexpensive tablesaw exclusively for this operation when I needed a small radius edge for my productline and couldn't find an appropriate router bit. Originally I thought of having a regular sawblade ground to a profile - when I discovered I could make virtually any "virtual radius" using a standard 15 degree alternate bevel blade.

Now we use it on virtually all our edges.

I hope some of my fellow woodworkers will find the method useful.


Ever wanted to ease an edge on your wood working project to a small radius of less than 1/8 inch?

Here is a simple way of obtaining "virtual radius" using a standard 1/8 inch kerf 15 degree alternate bevel sawblade in your tablesaw.

Set the blade angle to 45 degrees and use a machineable wood fence and table insert. Adjust the fence so that the centerline will travel exactly into the square edge of your workpiece - use eyeball and trial and error.

Adjust the virtual radius to any value up to about 1/8" by cranking the blade into the edge.

What you are actually getting are two facets cut along the originally square edge - creating 3 equal angles of 150 degrees. On this small a scale it looks and feels virtually like a true radius - especially if you sand lightly.
