

maker in San Francisco. Come early with a chair. Bob works on the restoration of old harpsicords as well as building new harpsichords. The construction of a new harpsichord can take from 4 to 6 months depending on the style of the harpsichord.

Our back to basics seminar will be on using both marking and mortising gauges. Don Naples will show us how these tools can improve accuracy and save time in the layout of many different types of woodworking joints.

This year I wanted to let my


committees do the job without interference from the president. But the Toys For Tots program never really got off the ground.

Most of us are trying to do is stay afloat in our jobs and our relationship with others and this preempts our work for BAWA.


So it was quite understandable when Pete called me this past month and told me that he had a painting job in Sacramento and couldn't work on Toys For Tots.

The Sacramento Area Woodworkers will give to the Salvation Army approximately 900 toys.




One of the seven toy workshops held at Nemy Electric



Here is a toy workshop and some of the finished toys at a meeting recently.


The San Joaquin Fine Woodworkers Association asked its members to make three toys each and some of the members made fifty toys and others made three.

Grand,1, 2, 3, and three Honorable Mentions. Then there are citations


