#### August Meeting

This month our Guest Speaker will be Debey Zito. Debey is a San Francisco furniture maker who specializes in art-and crafts residential furniture that has a distinctive element of Chinese style. Debey builds a complete range of residential furniture including kitchen table and chairs, bedroom furniture and beautifully sculpture wood sofas. She utilizes native American hardwood in her furniture with an emphasis on cherry, and she sometimes includes a small carving as a unique feature of her furniture design. When Debey is not busy building furniture she teaches woodworking classes at her shop.

We will have a back to basics seminar this month which will be given by Anne Glynn. Anne will discuss the art of Furniture Photography.

#### When Last We Met

We had a great meeting last month with a Back to Basics on Biscuit
Joinery with Tom Munro. There were lots of tips on how easy it is to cut the mortises and to make a biscuit joint.
As Tom explained it, it is much easier to do a biscuit join than using dowels. Although biscuit joinery is easier to use than an ordinary router, either both can be used.

The rest of the evening was spent in members showing items that they had made and the types of problems that they had overcome in the process.

Tom Clarke stated he grinds off part of the putty knife to the size of the biscuit, then he can insert the glue into the hole. In this way he can be positive that the glue is spread evenly throughout the hole and biscuit.

Tom also showed off his bathroom cabinet and the jigs he made to make the doors.

Kent Jorgensen who became a member that evening showed off his Koa/Maple butcherblock cutting board. You might be able to ask him about how to make one for your significant other for holidays.

Bob Berryman showed off the climbing toy that he made and another member asked me several days later who was the gentleman who made the toy.

Frank Sainsburg made several music boxes and had different tunes in each of them. He told us the reasons why he made each of the boxes.

Don McGrew had made a very unique workmate using wood and pipe clamps. He wants to send the plans and an article off to a woodworking magazine. Perhaps when it comes out in a magazine we will be able to have one in our shop. The best of luck to you, Don, in your publishing goals.
