

#### BACK TO BASICS

#### BAWA OUTREACH REPORT Don McGrew

The BAWA Outreach program is expanding beyond the nowmonthly *Toys for Tots* program and the annual *Christmas in April* participation to include *the Habitat for Humanity* program. This program provides homes for people through a combination of interest free loans, sweat equity from the prospective owners, and extensive homebuilding (design, carpentry, electrical, plumbing, etc.) help from volunteers.

Some local Habitat for Humanity programs we can participate in:

- 1. San Francisco H. for H.: 415-750-4780. Projects begin in spring '97.
- 2. Peninsula H. for H.: 415-324-2266. Voluntéers needed until November 1997 on the 24-unit Gloria Way Project. Tuesdays-Saturdays 8:15-4:30; half-days acceptable Tues-Fri; full days only on Sat.
- 3. East Bay H. for H.: 510-251-6304, Volunteer Coordinator Chris Becker.
  - Two year more work on half-done 40 units at 375 105th Ave, Oakland
  - Jan. 31, 1997: 350 volunteers needed for 1 day of wall prefab, 8AM-4:30PM at Alameda military base. Call Chris for directions.
  - Collegiate Challenge: Feb 25-last week of March; 1-2 groups/week from colleges nationwide; need experienced builders to supervise.
  - July '97 Buildathon: 6-10 homes framed in 3-5 days; need 200 volunteers/day.
  - Other skills/services needed besides building: office volunteers, materials and skilled trades location, fundraising, All Women's Crew, graphic design, youth outreach, public speaking, faith relations, welcome wagon.

# TOYS FOR TOTS REPORT Don McGrew

Thanks to Bob Steves, Tony Fanning, Al Semenaro, Alan Harrison, Nick Korens, Bill Hensel, Stan Booker, Linda Salter—and any whose names I missed—for over 400 memberbuilt toys donated through our Toys for Tots program at BAWA's 1996 Potluck Dinner Meeting.

This is a greater than 4-fold increase over 1995's donations.

It doesn't even include toys donated earlier this year by Bob Steves (who also contributed Bob Potter-designed animal pattern sets to other *Toys For Tots* volunteers) to Lucille Packard's Mobil Health Van program. Yea Bob! BAWA owes a great deal to Bob for his ability and generosity.

We had so many toys that we couldn't safely carry them all in our Ghia, so Bob Steves took the remainder and found them a good home with the U. S. Marine Corps Toy program.

S. F. General's Volunteer Coordinator, Kim Dunstin, asked if we could bring some of the smaller toys to the Outpatient Children's Christmas Party, so Al Semenero and I handed out over a hundred toys to sick kids.

I believe that we should now try for a delivery of toys every month (I say we shoot for 150 a month).

We have three children's hospitals to take care of: Oakland Children's Hospital, S.F. General, and Lucille Packard's Children's Hospital, each with their own outreach programs.

They can each use as many toys as we can make.

Each toy contributor explained construction procedures and answered questions. Everyone mentioned that **Don** was their inspiration, motivator, and general nagger and that without him it wouldn't have been nearly as successful. Great job, **Don** and all **BAWA** toy makers!

Our Association has been offered the opportunity to participate in the San Mateo 1997 Home and Garden Show (February 28 - March 2), which would like to add a woodworking segment this year. We will have a booth to display our work and a platform where we can discuss our craft. We will discuss this further at our January meeting. Al Semenero's proposal is to have BAWA members construct garden furniture which we could raffle off at the Home and Garden Show. We could use raffle proceeds to beef up the BAWA treasury to support our other programs. Come to the January meeting, give your input, and volunteer to help with the Home and Garden Show.
