
January 21 Meeting

our **Tormek Grinder** Arnie Champagne asked if there was any interest in having a mechanical veneering press added to the tool library. Mike also announced that thanks to the computer being donated by member **Jim Voos**, we now have 80 to 100 new names of potential members who signed up at the at our booth at the *Northern California Woodworking Show* in November. Mike also thanked all the members who worked in the booth during the three day show and who donated work to be displayed.

Additional miscellaneous announcements:

Member Jim Voos announced the WINKLER WOOD PRODUCTS in Hawaii will give us a 5-10% discount on exotic woods like Koa, Macadamia Nut, Lychie, etc. Member Carl Johnson indicated a source for a few used vacuum pumps removed from old medical equipment going for \$50.00. Call him for details at 650/349-8213. Gene Wagg asked if anyone knew of a source for plans for a dog house. Several members responded. Mike Bray offered white oak veneer off-cuts to anyone who wants some.

Mike Bray thanked all of the dedicated officers and committee chairs who helped out for 1998, then opened the floor for nominations and voting of the officers and volunteers for committee chairs for 1999. The people listed in the box on the lower left of page 1 were unanimously voted into office for the coming year by all present. Welcome to all these folks and thank you for taking on these jobs.

Show and Tell:

Stan Booker led off by showing a "mystery tool" that members guessed was probably a super sized soldering iron. Norm Paris then showed one of a pair of nightstands of Pennsylvania Cherry. He mentioned Grofflin Hough in Pennsylvania supplied the wood, and the plans came from WoodSmith magazine. Norm started the project when he lived in Pennsylvania, and completed it just recently after moving to California. He finished these handsome stands with Barclay's Gel Finish over a gel stain. Next Arnie Champagne showed a curved stretcher that is part of a dining table he's building (See January program announcement on p. 1 for more on this table.) Arnie built a curved plane to shape the stretcher exactly the way he wanted. He's using 3 coats of wipe on polyurethane to finish it. Bill Helms showed a wonderful wooden rocking horse of several different types of wood and explained the trials and tribulations of making the Christmas deadline. Bob Steeves displayed some of his toy trucks, this particular style is his own design. He also showed an unusual toy bed. Stan Booker brought a large toy truck made according to a design he modified. Arnie also showed a great use for scrap wood blocks which he made into a Tinker Toy block set. Gene Wagg displayed another artful use of scraps -- these made into toy cars. Carl Johnson showed the box he made to display sample teas. It has solid wood sides and a veneer top, all of Canadian Big Leaf Maple. The top edge is outlined with a dark wood. It took some twenty hours to make and he finished it with 3 coats of an oil finish. And finally Linda Salter and her husband Dick showed the delightful children's toy chest they built. Dick built the wooden chest with a barrel top using staves cut at a 7 degree angle and assembled with biscuits. Then Linda painted a fantastic underwater scene that continues around all four sides and the top. Fish, plants, etc. are displayed against a background of blue water and beige sand of the ocean bottom.

Thanks to all the members who shared their work with us and to those who brought toys to donate.


