
Our March meeting will open with a **Techniques Talk** by **Paul Cumes** of **FESTO** (www.toolguide.net). Paul will explain the patented FESTO system of using an integrated portable guide system to hold either saw or router on a tabletop or on sawhorses. This presentation will begin *promptly* at 7PM.

Our main presentation will be by our own BAWA member Per Madsen of Per Madsen Design (it is a small company dedicated to the making of well crafted, high quality modular furniture for audio video recording media, equipment and more). We will meet at the Per Madsen Design manufacturing site. His customers order by mail or web and seldom if ever does a customer visit the shop, but we get to check it out!

Per has designed a product line that provides many choices in arrangement by the customer. The product line is called **RACKIT** and comes in a choice of woods. Per will give us a tour of the shop. Technique Talk

Mike Bray gave a presentation on Basic Shop Drawing. Right before our eyes he made a series of quick concept sketches. He suggested that you might want to do this for a piece you want to build. You can work out the details of the joinery you want and what the dimensions of each part will be. These sketches should be quick and spontaneous. Then when you've made your decisions you can transfer the final information onto one clean sheet. Use this sheet of dimensioned drawings as a reference when purchasing your lumber and then post it on your shop wall during the construction of the piece. Thanks for presenting these good ideas Mike!

Also remember to bring those old shop tools, etc. for our silent auction each meeting.

Guests included: George Chu who retired a few years ago and has been working on his cottage; and Fred Deubert who's also repairing his house and making some furniture. New Member Harold Patterson says he works with computers but wants to make furniture.

Membership Chair Robbie Fanning and member Tony Fanning discussed an Adirondack chair making class they took, which prompted a discussion of courses available locally. Linda Salter mentioned that Hillsdale High has an adult ed. course in woodworking. Contact her for details. The College of the Redwoods brochure is out. Sign up in March for summer courses there.

Show and Tell

Mike Bray passed around a link belt he bought at Grainger Supply (check your white pages for a local store like the one in Berkeley). These work great at dampening vibration on contractor style saws and other belt-driven tools. It worked wonders on his saw as evidenced by the wood sample he passed around with before and after cuts. Richard Shirasawa passed around copies of a handy dandy wood screw chart he downloaded from www.woodmagazine.com. You can get your own copy there. Linda Salter showed a turned bowl she made. It has contrasting colors of different kinds of wood in a geometric pattern. This is her first segmented bowl project and it is beautiful. Jay Perrine showed BAWA embroidered shirts that members can order. Let him know which design you would like to buy.

Main Presentation

Jimmy Reinna of Tools Tools Tools gave a great presentation on tools, toolmakers and the history of tool marketing. Jimmy's presentation began with a discussion of Homo Erectus, humanity's first tool making ancestors, and ended with modern boutique toolmakers like Ron Hock, Bridge City, Holty and Lie-Nielson. He discussed the effect of the Industrial Revolution on the making of tools, and even more intriguing, the major change in distribution and then manufacturing of tools in America brought about by modern advertising starting in the 1950s and 60s. This branding by Stanley and a few other companies allowed them to dominate their competitors in certain tool types (see editor's note below). Jimmy showed some of the books he had used for his research and he displayed many old and new hand tools including a new Holty Plane that costs 'only' \$4,000. Thanks Jimmy for a very interesting and informative talk. We'll now look at our tools with more knowledge and understanding of why they are as they are! Visit his shop in Berkeley to see more.

(Editor's Note. Jimmy told us a story of cut-throat marketing tactics which he learned from relatives in the shirt business – but the exact same thing happens in the tool business. One shirt salesman will show up at a store, buy all the shirts he sees and sell the store his shirts. He then tears out the labels and sells the other-brand shirts to flea-market guys or brand-names-for-less outfits. So he gets his shirts in the right stores, but has to buy the display space. Marketing tactics control our choices more than we would like to think...)

For our April 19th meeting we will return to Foster City for the BOX CONTEST and also a slide presentation by Craig Mineweaser (Yeung will be out of town, but he accompanied Craig on the tours) of a huge veneer plant and McBeath's lumber plant.
